





She married in 1917 and lived for 18 years on a farm west of town. She and her husband had four children. A daughter died in infancy. A son died 20 years ago. She now has a son in California and a daughter in Michigan as well as 12 grandchildren and 19 great grandchildren. "My oldest great grandchild is 18 so if I live to be 80 I just may have a great great grand-

child," she said. Madge moved to town from the farm in 1939 when she and her husband separated. She returned to cafe work and in 1943 she bought the restaurant where she worked and called it <u>Madge's Cafe</u>. and rolls on Saturday morning. "I love it here," she said.

Every afternoon she plays cards from 4 to 6 at the Meal Site and in her spare time she likes to crochet. "I made a full afghan during the three weeks in Michigan."

She has arthritis in her legs, but "it's okay if I remember to take my medicine. 1 can remember everything in the past—even dates—but sometimes I can't remember to take my medicine," she said. (Madge Peters' series of

(Madge Peters' series or columns will start next week.) had passed by recurring health problems.

Along with restaurant work she cleaned houses. "There are more old houses in this town that I've cleaned than I haven't, "she said.

Somewhere she acquired the nickname of "Buggies" and as Buggles she did a lot of papering and painting. She had a Model A Ford with a rumble scat, she recalls, and she would load the rumble scat with ladders and paste board as she went about town doing her job.

She went to California in 1957 with her son and spent 20, years there, 17 of them working in restaurants as a waitress and as a pastry cook.

"Restaurant work is hard work," she said, "but I loved it. You see somebody different every day. I like working with the public."

She says she made good money in California. The money wasn't always so good in cafes in Dunlap. "It's a farm town," she said. "If the farmers have money, you make money."


A few years after she retired at the age of 69 she returned to Dunlap. "Actually I never left Dunlap. In that 20 years I was back here 16 times." She said she returned to Dunlap because it was home even though she has no family here.

"I like the small town because here everyone is concerned about one another. This morning someone offered to help me get out of a snow drift. In California nobody ever offered any help to anyone. I didn't even know the last name of the girls I worked with. Someone could die next door and you'd never know."

She was invited to be cook at the Meal Site when she returned but she insisted she was retired. She works as a volunteer instead and helps serve meals every day and, as an officer in the Senior Citizens Club, helps the president, Rena Berens, with coffee

There are plans for a Grand Opening to initiate the new venture.




