

Voters Decide Wednesday on New Fire Hall

\$35,000 Bond Issue Hangs in Balance Jan. 28

Dunlap Polls Open at 8:00 a.m.

Dunlap V Brightness and C Wednesday in Dunlap is to nave a new city hall and fire station, meeting room and public rest rooms. A municipal election has been called for that day to okay a \$35,000 bond issue.

Action on the new project was started last fall by the City Council. The preliminary legal work has been done and publications made calling the election for Wednesday, Jan. 28. The polls will be open from 8:00 a.m. until 8:00 p.m. Voting will be done at the old city hall.

If the bond issue carries, a new 50 by 80 cement block building will be built this summer on the site of the present city hall and the adjoining lot to the east, recently purchased by the city.

Though a maximum bond issue of \$35,000 is being asked, it is estimated that the building should not cost more than \$30,000. Mayor O. E. Bramson said this week, that the bond issue would be made only large enough to cover the actual cost of the structure.

The building will provide ample space for both fire trucks and the emergency unit, plus a hose drying rack. The structure will also house public rest rooms, a meeting room sufficient to accommodate 200 people, a space for two jail cells and a room with kitchen facilities. Space for a council chamber is also included.

It is estimated that only an additional property tax levy of 1.5 to 2 mills will be needed to pay off the bond issue.

If the voters okay the new building at the election Tuesday, immediate steps will be taken to call for bids and work will start as soon as weather permits, Mayor Bramson said.

Bond Issue Carries 407 Yes, 88 No

Dunlap voters gave a resounding "Okay" to the construction of a new combination fire and city hall. They went to the polls Wednesday and voted 407 to 88 to issue bonds up to \$35,000 for the construction of the new building.

The bond issue carried by a much wider margin than most pre-election predictions indicated. The vote was one of the largest recorded here on a special election when 495 voters turned out to mark their ballots.

Members of the fire department were busy most of the afternoon contacting voters and seeing they had transportation to the polling place. Only 125 votes had been cast up to one o'clock Wednesday afternoon. The heavy balloting ran during the late afternoon and into the evening.

The city council plans to take immediate steps to call for bids and to sell the bonds so that construction may be started as soon as weather permits. It will take from three to four weeks to complete necessary legal publications and to allow time to elapse as required by law. It will probably be four to six weeks before contracts can be let for the project.

City Sells Fire Hall Building

Neal and Corey Get Structures

The Dunlap City council sold the city hall and Kids Candy shop buildings at a special meeting Monday night. The buildings had been advertised for sale on sealed bids to be opened Monday night.

Elmer Neal was successful bidder at \$201.50 on the present city hall. It will have to be torn down so that construction work can start on the new city hall and fire station

The City traded the Kids Candy shop building to Ivan Corey for 10 feet of land adjoining the present city property. This will give the city a 60 foot front, so that sidewalks may be built around the side of the new fire hall, to the jail which will be located in the rear. Mr. Corey plans to move the Kids Candy Shop building to the lot east of where it now stands.

The McKenney-Seabury Co. were successful bidders for the lot and present jail and fire building located west of the Hughes Hotel. The bid on this property was \$250.00.

Council Calls for Bids on Dunlap Fire Hall

Letting Will Be May 1, Must Finish Sept. 20

All Plans and **Drawings Complete**

A call has been issued this week for bids on the new City Hall and Fire Station by the Dunlap City Council. Bids must be filed with the clerk and will be opened at a special meeting of the Council to be held Friday, May 1, at 7:30 p.m. in the basement of the City Librarv.

Dunlap voters okayed the proposal and the issuance of bonds up to \$35,000 by a wide margin at a special election held early this year.

All preliminary plans, specifications and legal requirements have now been complied with by the Council and legal publication is being made this week for offical bids on the project.

The proposal for bids specifies that the building shall be completed by next September 20th. The building is to be 50 by 80 feet of masonry construction, to be erected on the site of the present city hall and the adjoining lot to the east purchased last year.

Demolition work has already started on the old hall and fire building. The fire trucks are now being housed in the city storage building in the southeast part of town. The emergency unit is located at the M. and S. Garage.

Plans and specifications call for 123 yards of concrete, 9,300 cement blocks, 12 tons of steel, 5000 clay face brick, besides windows, doors and kitchen equipment.

Plans and specifications for the building were drawn by Ted Rogers and were approved by E. J. Sessinghaus, architect of Omaha.

\$32,526 Low Construction Bid on City Hall

Contract Goes to Mapleton Firm Tuesday Night

Work Must Start Within Ten Days

Construction work on the new city hall and fire station will start within the next two weeks, according to action taken by the Dunlap City Council.

The Haubrich Construction company of Mapleton was the low bidder on the project and will be awarded the construction job when a contract is signed next Tuesday evening, according to present plans of the Council. Construction work must start within ten days following it's signing according to provisions included in the contract.

Bids were opened Friday evening, May 1, but formal awarding of the contract was not made until the regular meeting of the Council Monday evening. Six bids on the project were on file. They varied from the low of \$32,526 by the Haubrich firm to a high of \$44,921 by Wife Whetmore of Onawa.

Mayor O. E. Bramson, said that though the Haubrich bil was for only \$32,526, the full bond issue of \$35,000 authorized at the election in January would be made. In addition to the amount due the Haubrich company on its contract, there will be architect, inspection and legal fees to pay, he said.

There has been no provision made under the Haubrich contract for fluorescent lighting, furniture for the council room and community room will also be extra, he said.

According to state law, it is mandatory that the council accept the lowest bid, or reject all bids, the council was advised. According to the contract the successful bidder is required to post a 100 per cent bond for the satisfactory completion of the project. It must be finished in at least 120 days from the signing of the contract, or early in September.





OFFICIAL PUBLICATION

By-Laws Governing Use Of Dunlap City Hall

The Dunlap City Hall shall be under the direct supervision and management of the duly elected Town Council of Dunlap, Iowa. All funds necessary for mainten-ance, fixtures, furnishings, and supplies shall be obtained according to the laws of the State of Iowa.
All fees collected for use of the facilities of the City Hall shall be disbursed according to the laws

of the State of Iowa.

The policing of the facilities of the City Hall shall be the responsibility of the Mayor of the Town of Dunlap and his duly appointed peace officers.

A. COUNCIL CHAMBERS

1. The City Council, Mayor and Clerk shall have the sole right to the facilities of the council chambers, except that, if the City Council deems it advisable they may allow other civic or non-profit groups to use the facilities temporarily. The door of said room shall

be locked at all times when not in use by the above individuals or groups.

B. REST ROOMS

1. The rest rooms shall be available to any individual or group entilted to any of the facilities of the building under these bylaws.

2. The rest rooms shall be available to the public from 8 a.m. each morning until 7 p.m. each evening, except that on evenings when the majority of the business places of Dunlap are open to the public, the rest room shall be available until 10 p.m.

C. FIRE STATION AND FIRE-MEN'S SCHOOL ROOM 1. The facilities of the fire stat-

ion and the firemen's school room shall be under the supervision of the Dunlap City Fire Chief whose authority is provided for in the

City Code.

D. PUBLIC MEETING ROOM

1. Qualfications; The facilities
of the public meeting room shall
be available to the following in dividuals or groups, who, in the opinion of the Mayor of the Town of Dunlap Iowa, are or are composed of, responsible persons of desirable reputation and who will agree to conform to these bylaws in

every respect.

a. Without charge to any civic organization, organized to promote the general welfare and good of

the community.

b. Without charge to any organ-

ized youth group sponsored by any local church, civic organization, or school, when chaperoned by at least one member of the sponsoring organization for each twenty members of the youth group.

c. Without charge to any relig-

ous group, who owns and regularly operates a place of worship in the town of Dunlap, Iowa, for the purpose of social or recreational entertainment, or fund raising camp-

d. Without charge to any political party who filed at least 5% of the votes cast in the last primary election held in the Town of Dun-

lap, Iowa.
e. Without charge to any farm group from the Dunlap trade area for the purpose of participation in any Federal or State Government

sponsored, educational, conservational, or marketing program.

f. Without charge to any non-profit organization, for the purpose of a fund raising campaign to benefit a local community enterprise. Said organization, campaign, and enterprise, to be approved by the Town Council prior to application.

g. To any local non-profit group organized for social, recreational, or educational purposes. Such groups shall pay an hourly fee of \$2.50 per hour with \$5.00 minimum.

h. To any established business or professional man owning or managing a concern which posesses taxable property in the town of Dunlap, for the purpose of customer or employee education or entertainment, or businessmen's dis-cussions. In no case shall admission be charged or any profit making transactions be attempted or completed during such meetings. Such groups shall pay an hourly fee as provided for in paragraph (g) above.

2. Application;

a. The public meeting room shall be reserved by filing a signed application, on forms supplied by the city, with the Mayor of the Town of Dunlap, for any week day when no conflicting applications have been filed prior. Said room shall also be available on Sundays, as above, if in the opinion of the Mayor, the function or purpose of the meeting is in accord with the principles or ideals of the organized churches in the Town of Dunlap.

b. Any fees required for the use of the facilities shall be collected at the time of application.

4. Responsibility

a. In the event that damages occur to the building or equipment while the facilities are in use by a group or individual, he or they shall be held hable for such damages and shall be billed accordingly.

3. Restrictions:

a. The public meeting room shall not be open to any individual or group before 8:00 a.m. or after 12 o'clock midnight.

b. No group or individual shall sell, serve, drink, or have on his person or bring into the public meeting room or corridor leading to said room, or on city property outside of the building, any alcoholic beverages.

c. At no time will an orchestra be allowed for the purpose of dancing.

d. No group or individual shall have possession of the facilities of the city hall on more than three consecutive days or evenings without special arrangements.

e. No application shall be accepted more than 30 days or less than 3 days before the date applied for.

f. Any foreign objects or materials brought on to the premises of the city hall by any group or in-dividual useing the facilities of the public meeting room shall be removed by 8 a.m. of the following day.

1. All paragraphs listed under section E. Public Meeting Room, shall apply to the Kitchen.

2. A fee shall be charged each individual or group who wishes to use the facilities of the kitchen. Said fee to be \$5.00 per day to defray the added expense of water,

clectrical, and janitor services.
F. AMENDMENTS
1. Forgoing by-laws may be amended at any time.
